Why does literacy matter?

Literacy is the foundation for achievement generally.



High levels of literacy

- Drive educational success
- Improve health outcomes
- Directly impact income levels
- Strengthen cultural identity

- Promote better mental health
- Promote widespread participation in economic, cultural, social and political life



Low levels of literacy

• Are prevalent in children with speech, language and communication needs

• Are a predictor of criminal activity and incarceration

• Suppress a country's GDP

Rich Early Language is the bedrock of Literacy



Harvard's Centre on the Developing Child has led the research for 30+ years

Harvard identifies 5 key scientific concepts that are the building blocks of child development.

80% of neural connections are made in the first 1,000 days from conception and brain architecture is powered by responsive, back & forth interactions, aka Serve and Return.
